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#### Priest's Corner

"The powers of heaven now invisibly minister together with us; Behold, now enters the King of Glory. This mystical sacrifice is superlatively heralded."

These words from the liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts, now emblazoned across our new iconostasis, encapsulates and exemplifies the very reason for the existence of the Earthly Church. It is here, in this holy place, where Heaven and Earth are united during the

Divine Liturgy. God is here, now and in this altar, present together with the Heavenly Host.

Some have asked as to why we put so much effort and money into our church. In answering this, I am reminded of the magnificent cathedrals of Europe, which took decades - if not centuries - to build. Builders, stonecutters and sculptors, woodworkers and iconographers were born, lived and died - spending an entire lifetime - building these churches. The answer to the question "why?" is simple - all to the Glory of God. All out of love and dedication to Him. In gratitude to God for His

endless mercies, we give to Him our very best, and nothing less. And while this gratitude is expressed outwardly by these efforts, we also understand that most importantly - we must bring to God our spiritual "best." This is why our churches are so beautifully adorned to His Glory - to allow us to sense a foreshadowing of the Eternal Kingdom, to give us a place to focus our attention on Him and on our spiritual lives. It is here, in our churches, where we can escape, for a time, our earthly concerns and difficulties and find peace. It is here, while still being earthly dwellers, we can experience the heavenly; here, instead of being overly concerned with the tangible, we can reach out

and touch the intangible, here where the temporal becomes secondary as we seek out the eternal.

The artisans of the past knew this and were grateful to have had the opportunity to create something so magnificent to the Glory of God. Who these people were no one knows, but God does. In a similar fashion, a few generations from now, we too, shall be forgotten. Yet, this is of no concern to us. What is, is that we have had the opportunity to create something beautiful to the Glory of God and to provide our children and - God willing - many future generations, a place where they too, may glorify Him and take ad-

vantage of the grace which abides in this holy place unto the salvation of their souls.

priest, Fr. Seth and his family.

adna Vinokouroff - two of the founding members of our parish, but was also site of our first "regular" liturgies. Archbishop Anthony of blessed memory (+2000), would send a cathedral priest - once a month - to celebrate liturgy in the Vinokouroff home. The dining room was used as an

vinokouroff home. The dining room was used as an altar, while the sunken living room served as the "nave" where the faithful stood and prayed. These services were followed by lunch and plans for further fundraising to eventually buy property and build a church. In 1980, the church hall and rectory were built, at which time, the parish moved there with regular services being conducted by Fr. Paul Gribanovsky. When Ariadna, and later Arkady

Vinokouroff passed away in the early 2000's, the house was bequeathed to the parish. However, since both Fr. Paul and Fr. Alexander owned their own homes, the house was rented out.

When our last tenants vacated the property in early September, it was clear that a great deal of renovation and upgrading was needed in order to bring it up-to-date and welcoming for our new priest and his young family. Since that time, Fr. Athanasius, Michael Mogilev, Olga Reighard and others, have been volunteering hours upon hours of time repainting, cleaning, repairing and upgrading the house. I am deeply grateful to them and to all those who managed even a few hours to come out and help to make Fr. Seth and his family welcome in their new home.

#### Being God's Messenger When we put on Christ, we become God's messenger

Walking through life with a smile on our face and a song in our heart is the best way to keep our mind and heart in a good place. Life has many turns and many trials, but when we keep centered on all the good that is in our life, the trials are short lived.

Smiles are contagious. Ever notice how a room brightens up when someone walks in who is always smiling, always happy, always extending a warm greeting to others? What better gift can we give another, than a sincere smile.

I remember finding a young man sitting on a log, deep on the trail above Multnomah Falls, on the Columbia River of Oregon, many years ago. I'd hiked up the switchback trail to the primordial forest. As a young man I'd frequently run that trial, finding the peace and solitude I so craved.

About four miles from the top, I was somewhat surprised to find another person, sitting alone on a log. Since there had been only one other car parked at the lodge, I did not expect to see anyone. As he was deep in thought, I apologized for startling him. Sensing something was wrong, I commented on the beauty of God's creation and asked if he'd like to share a sandwich and some coffee. He surprised me with his question, asking if I was an angel.

Sitting down on the log next to him, I opened my backpack, and offered him half of my lunch. A few moments passed when he turned to me, showed me a revolver, and told me he'd come to this remote spot with the intent of killing himself. When he saw me appear with a long white beard and hair, and dressed in my

long black robe, he'd first thought I might be an angel, sent by God.

He'd been praying that God would forgive him for what he was about to do. I assured him that I was indeed flesh and blood, and certainly no angel. But I also told him that I was sent by God with a message. The message from God was that he was loved, and that God had a plan for his life, and this period of despair would soon pass.

He handed me his revolver. I emptied the gun of the bullets, and placed it in my backpack, and we had a long conversation about his life. Eventually we walked together back to our vehicles. With the promise that he would return the revolver to his father, and let him know he'd intended kill himself, until that encounter with a monk, I handed him the gun, and we parted ways.

I've long wondered about the direction his life must have taken after that encounter in the forest, so very many years ago. I've also wondered what would have happened if I'd continued on that trail without stopping to greet him, without offering a smile and a shared sandwich.

To this day I feel blessed that God allowed me to be His messenger on that lonely trail, and I try to be available each and every day as His messenger. When we make a concerted effort to be centered in Christ, each and every day, each and every hour, we make way for a heart and mind that is always in a good place, and we allow the love of Christ to be seen and experienced by others. When we put aside ourselves and put on Christ, we become God's messengers.

#### Saint Demetrius of Thessalonica (October 26 / November 8)

Saint Demetrius suffered in Thessalonica during the reign of Galerius Maximian (c. 306). He belonged to one of the most distinguished families of the province of Macedonia and was widely admired not only because of his noble ancestry and grace of bearing, but also for virtue, wisdom and goodness of heart surpassing that of his elders.

The military expertise of Saint Demetrius led Galerius, as Caesar of the Eastern Empire, to appoint him commander of the Roman forces in Thessaly and Proconsul for Hellas. But for all this, Demetrius remained ever aware of the underlying realities of life. Since

faith in Christ had touched his heart, all the glory of this world meant nothing to him, and there was nothing he preferred to teaching and preaching the word of God.

Despite the persecution directed against Christians by the Emperor, Saint Demetrius brought a large number of pagans to the faith. His words convinced them



because they saw in the righteousness, peace and brotherly love that marked his life an illustration of the truth of which he spoke.

The Emperor Maximian had just won a series of brilliant victories over the Scythians and was on his way back to Rome

when he halted at Thessalonica to receive the acclamations of the populace and to offer sacrifices in thanksgiving to the idols. A number of pagans, envious of the success of the Saint, took advantage of the Emperor's presence in the city to denounce Demetrius as a Christian. Maximian's astonishment gave way to violent indignation when he was told that Demetrius' was making use of his official position to spread the faith. Demetrius was summoned and confined in a cell, located in the basement of nearby baths.

Maximian arranged for games and gladiatorial combats to take place in the amphitheater of the city. He had brought with him a man of gigantic stature and Herculean strength called Lyaios, a Vandal by origin. Such was this man's strength and skill in single combat that no one could withstand him. There was in the city a young Christian called Nestor, who observing the empty pride of the Emperor in the victories of his champion, made up his mind to show him that real power belongs to Christ alone. He ran to the baths where Demetrius was imprisoned and asked for the protection of his prayer in going to confront the giant. The Martyr made the sign of the Cross on the brow and the heart of the boy, and sent him like David before Goliath. He reached the amphitheater just as the heralds were crying out on all sides for any who would

stand against Lyaios. Advancing towards the Emperor, Nestor threw his tunic to the ground and shouted, "God of Demetrius, help me!" In the first encounter, at the very moment the giant rushed upon him, Nestor slipped aside and stabbed him to the heart with his dagger. There was uproar and amazement at the marvel, and people asked themselves how a mere child, relying neither on strength nor weapons, could so suddenly have brought down the barbarian.

Rather than yield to the sign of the sovereign power of God, the Emperor flew into a rage and ordered the immediate arrest of Nestor and his beheading outside the city. He had heard Nestor calling upon the God of Demetrius and, supposing the Saint had used some kind of witchcraft, Maximian ordered his soldiers to go and thrust Demetrius through with their lances, without trial, in the depths of his prison cell. There were some Christians, including Demetrius' servant Lupus, present at his martyrdom, and when the soldiers had gone, they reverently buried the Saint's body.

It was God's will that the grace with which He filled Saint Demetrius should remain active even after his death. This is why He caused myrrh to flow from his body with a delightful scent, which had the property of healing all who took it as an unction, with faith in the intercession of the Saint. Time and again, during sixteen hundred years, Saint Demetrius has given proof of his benevolent care for the city of Thessalonica and its inhabitants. He has defended them from the attacks of barbarians, he has preserved them from plague and famine, healed the sick and comforted the afflicted.

#### Archangel Homeschool Academy Scottish Country Dancing Has Come to Sts. Peter and Paul

Through a collaboration between Archangel Homeschool Academy and renowned Scottish dance teacher Ron Wallace, Sts. Peter and Paul Russian Orthodox Church is now host to a weekly Scottish Country Dance class. The class began in September as part of AHA's regular courses and is a smashing success. All ages are welcome and all levels. We have five-year-old intermediate students and teenage beginners dancing with mothers and grandparents and everyone

in between. This class is open for parishioners, and drop-in classes are optional.

Teacher Ron Wallace has been teaching soft shoe and hard shoe Scottish dancing for over thirty years in Sonoma County. His dances perform all over the Bay Area, including at the famous Scottish Country Games. When some of his long-term students had children of their own, they asked Mr. Wallace to create a class for younger ages. The class became a sought-after success, held at the beautiful Monroe Hall in Santa Rosa. Last year, AHA director Amanda Merriss approached Mr. Wallace about combining his children's class with AHA and bring the class to Sts. Peter and Paul. Mrs. Merriss says that the mental benefits from this particular dance form is extremely beneficial for children. Not only do they embody lessons in rhythm, spatial awareness, and planning ahead, but the dance form supplements mathematics, music, and history among other subjects. And with any social country dance, the more, the merrier! Large classes are especially lively and joyful.

To join, classes are held Mondays from 2:00-3:00pm. Every class is \$5 per dancer per class. Checks and cash are accepted.

Soft shoes or dance slippers are advised such as ballet or clean tennis shoes. Socks are too slippery and sandals are dangerous.


